Civil, Family Law, Conservatorship and Guardianship Terminology for Spanish Court Interpreters

## COURSE SUMMARY \*CIMCE Approved – 6 Hours

This course focuses on Spanish/English terminology used in civil court, including terminology typical for pleadings, discovery,

pre-trial conferences, motions, interrogations, trials and alternative dispute resolutions.

In addition, two hours will be spent on Family Law terminology. Dissolution or marriage, mandatory settlement conferences, custody issues, and



mediation hearings will be covered in the Family Law section of this course.

Conservatorship and Guardianship terminology will also be discussed with their equivalencies in the target language. Basic Probate proceedings will also be part of this seminar.

Participants will practice the material presented using actual court documents and various court proceedings in audio. They will also receive login credentials to access an online interpreting laboratory with audio practices of various civil proceedings.

Nestor Wagner has been a certified Medical, Administrative Hearings, and Court Interpreter for over 15 years. In 1993, he founded and became the Director of the Southern CA School of Interpretation, in Los Angeles. Throughout my tribal court career, I contributed to California's Court Toolkit for Tribal/State/Federal Administrators and Clerks and developed a passion for teaching. I have given presentations to tribal communities on tribal court administration and to international judicial delegations from Egypt, Morocco, Jamaica, and Ukraine on tribal courts in the United States.
